As a self-funded association dedicated to supporting professionals in English language teaching throughout Croatia and beyond, HUPE has always strived to maintain high-quality services, events, and resources for its members.

Over the years, we have been fortunate to receive support from embassies and publishers from time to time. However, such external financing has decreased significantly, and we are now facing increased financial demands to maintain and further improve our activities.

To ensure that HUPE remains a strong, active and innovative organization, we will adjust our membership fees. This decision was not made lightly, but several important costs need to be covered, including:

- Renewal of our website to improve communication, usability and accessibility
- Improving members' access to membership status, duration, and benefits associated with active membership
- Establishment of a more accessible and simpler payment system for the collection of membership fees and registration fees
- Implementation of a system for enabling payments via **mobile banking** (barcode or QR code)
- Implementation of the Stripe payment system, which enables secure and flexible card payments
- Auditing and updating our **register of members**, improving accuracy and transparency
- Introduction of e-invoicing in accordance with the legal requirements announced
- Costs of workshops and meetings of members in branches
- Expanding **opportunities for members** to attend webinars, seminars and professional development events in Croatia and abroad

These steps are necessary to ensure that HUPE remains accountable to your needs and continues to provide meaningful value and engagement for all members.

HUPE DUBROVNIK BRANCH MEETING REPORT


The second HUPE Dubrovnik Branch meeting in 2024-2025 took place at Osnovna škola Blato


Following these two very interesting workshops, the current HUPE Dubrovnik president shared the latest HUPE news, such as the information about the new board,

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THE THIRD HUPE OSIJEK BRANCH MEETING IN SCHOOL YEAR 2024-2025

The third HUPE Osijek branch meeting in the school year 2024-2025 was held on 24 May 2025 at the Faculty of Education in Osijek. The 4-hour-long meeting was attended by 25 members.

The agenda included:

At the beginning of the meeting, **Sanja Rašković**, an English teacher and certified NLP trainer from Global Lingua private language school in Zaprešić, held a workshop titled **Stories**, *a powerful teaching tool*. She shared engaging, story-based activities designed to boost creativity and support language skills such as vocabulary, grammar, reading, listening, and speaking. This practical workshop highlighted the power of stories to make learning more enjoyable and meaningful across all age groups.

After the workshop, members were informed about the **news in HUPE**, including the new HUPE Board members, changes in membership fees from 1 June 2025, future teacher training courses in New York and Bath, the new edition of HUPEzine, upcoming conferences by our partner associations, and other regular branch updates. The branch president also notified the members about the details of the upcoming **33rd Annual International HUPE Conference**, which is taking place in Valamar Diamant Hotel, Poreč from 24 to 26 October 2025, such as the call for speakers, registration fees, accommodation, and transportation. Newly elected HUPE president Sanja Paić also attended the meeting and said a few words about the new website design and plans for future conferences.

After the updates, the **HUPE Osijek branch president elections** were held. There was only one candidate, acting Osijek branch president, Adrijana Roždijevac from Josip Kozarac Primary School in Soljani. Following the coffee break, the second workshop, titled **Let's Play with Words: Grammar and Vocab Unplugged!**, was held by **Dajana Vukadin** from Sveta Klara Primary School in Zagreb. She introduced a range of fun, classroom-tested games, from fast-paced speaking activities to strategy-based board games, that turn traditional grammar and vocabulary exercises into engaging, student-centred learning. The workshop focused on boosting motivation, creativity, and teamwork, while offering practical ideas easily adaptable for different age groups and levels.

At the end of the meeting, **Ivana Burić Kurtović** from Happy Melody private language school and **Eva Bogdanović** from Čarobna riječ private language school in Zagreb held a workshop titled **Colourful gardens: on creativity and global biodiversity in language education**. Through a story-based, game-like format, the workshop encouraged participants to tap into their creativity, explore cultural and linguistic diversity, and develop a growth mindset. Participants collected essential elements for healthy plant growth by engaging in different language activities that stimulated their imagination and promoted collaboration and critical thinking.

HUPE Osijek is thankful to the speakers and all the members who were able to attend the meeting on Saturday morning and create a friendly and relaxing atmosphere ideal for teachers connecting, collaborating, and exchanging ideas. I'm truly grateful for your trust and support in re-electing me to continue serving as the branch president.

THE THIRD HUPE SLAVONSKI BROD BRANCH MEETING IN 2024/2025 TOOK PLACE AT OSNOVNA ŠKOLA DRAGUTIN TADIJANOVIĆ IN SLAVONSKI BROD ON MAY 28, 2025.



Ivana Borozni presented her research: "Students' Experiences Learning English" at the HUPE Slavonski Brod teachers' meeting. She shared the findings from a survey conducted with 36 middle school students to explore their attitudes, preferences, and challenges in learning English. She highlighted that while most students understand the importance of English for their future, their levels of enthusiasm vary. The students showed a clear preference for interactive and mediabased learning activities such as games, videos, and music, rather than traditional grammar exercises. She noted that many students feel nervous about speaking in class, though a majority reported feeling reasonably comfortable. Grammar was identified as the most significant challenge, followed by difficulties in writing and speaking. The research also revealed that few students currently use digital learning apps, but most believe that technology could enhance their language learning experience. Students expressed a preference for working in pairs or groups over working alone. She concluded that incorporating more games, videos, and group activities into lessons could increase student engagement and confidence. Her presentation emphasized the importance of blending innovative, student-centered approaches with traditional teaching methods to create a more effective and balanced learning environment.

Mirta Kos Kolobarić led the workshop titled <u>"Education</u> for Sustainable Future" sharing practical activities and ideas from the structured course for teachers (Education for sustainable future) which the speaker attended within the 1st accredited project (project no. 2024-1-HR01-KA121-SCH-000206090). The workshop was engaging and thought-provoking, designed to encourage attendees to reflect critically on their own sustainable and unsustainable habits. Participants gained valuable new ideas on how to guide students toward changing their behavior in small but meaningful ways to support the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The activities sparked reflection among the attendees about sustainability, inspiring them to consider how even





baby steps can contribute to a more sustainable future. Overall, the workshop was highly informative, leaving teachers better equipped and motivated to integrate sustainability concepts into their classrooms.

After these two highly engaging workshops, Ivana Borozni, the current president of HUPE Slavonski Brod, shared the latest updates from HUPE. These included news about the new board, the HUPEzine, and the 33rd HUPE conference, which is scheduled to be held in Poreč from October 24 to 26, 2025. All attendees were encouraged to take part in the HUPE newsletter and HUPEzine, and to contribute to the digital materials on our website.

HUPE members attending the meeting cast their votes for the branch president. Ivana Borozni was re-elected as the president of the HUPE Slavonski Brod branch.



REPORT ON 38TH ANNUAL APPI CONFERENCE – ELT IN A MULTIMODAL WORLD, 25TH – 27TH APRIL 2025

I recently had the chance to take part in the 38th APPI Annual Conference, held at the ISCTE - Instituto Universitário de Lisboa, and what an inspiring experience it was! Organised by the amazing APPI team APPI, the event brought together passionate teachers, educators, and professionals from across Europe to share ideas, practices, and plenty of positive energy.

The conference featured an impressive lineup of plenary speakers. Nik Peachey opened with a thought-provoking

talk Multimodality in English Language Teaching and Learning, setting the tone for a multimodally-centred event. Rose Aylett focused on Transformative teaching: seven principles for critical language pedagogy, George Kokolas highlighted the importance of positivity in education in his "Positive Education for Beginners", while Gabriel Díaz Maggioli Fulfilling students' needs one "E" at a time! offered practical frameworks for dealing with complexity of students' actual learning needs and shaping our teaching accordingly. Nayr Ibrahim's session "From teacher to activist: visualize, decolonize and demonolingualize ELT" beautifully tied together multimodality and multilingualism, stating the need for ELT to become a space for equity, inclusivity and linguistic justice.

I was truly honoured to present my own session, "Gender Equality: Are We There Yet? – a classroom project". I shared how my students engaged with gender equality issues through creative, multimodal activities and collaboration. What made the experience even more rewarding were the meaningful conversations that followed. Colleagues from Portugal shared their own classroom perspectives and challenges, and a few even expressed interest in joining the project next year—an unexpected and very welcome outcome! A particular highlight for me was Sandra Luna's talk, "Why do I need a teacher? I learn English better with...!". Her session struck a powerful chord, reminding us that our students are all the same across the world, and our classrooms are also spaces for promoting values, empathy, and critical thinking.

Huge thanks to both HUPE and APPI for giving me the opportunity to be a part of such a dynamic, warm, and enriching event. I left Lisbon feeling inspired, connected, and full of new ideas to bring back to my students and colleagues. Until next time!

23RD ELTA SERBIA CONFERENCE

The 23rd ELTA Serbia International Conference took place on 16–17 May 2025 at Alfa BK University in Belgrade, Serbia. It was rganized by the English Language Teachers' Association (ELTA) Serbia and it brought together educators from around the world to share innovative practices and experiences in English language teaching.

The event offered more than fifty workshops and talks, and seven plenary sessions. Experts from 20 countries contributed to the success of the conference. The overall theme, inspired by Nelson Mandela's quote, "It always seems impossible until it's done," highlighted the challenges and magic of teaching in modern classrooms. Accredited by the Institute for Educational Advancement (ZUOV), the conference provided a platform for professional development and networking among English language teachers.

Teaching is much more than just conveying information — it's about permanently adjusting to the ever-changing world of education, motivating students, and including technology into everyday classroom activities. Modern teachers are expected to find the right balance between traditional and modern methods, often engaging with students who are more digitally fluent than ever before. Despite the difficulties they face, teachers worldwide continually accomplish extraordinary feats, transforming challenges into opportunities each and every day.

I had the honour and pleasure to participate in the conference as a speaker. My workshop dealt with Engaging Classrooms: Project-Based Teaching and Technology for Motivating Students. In this 45-minute interactive

workshop, I explored practical approaches to projectbased teaching, highlighting how modern technology and innovative teaching methods can enhance the learning experience and make lessons student-centred. The session provided strategies for integrating digital tools into lessons while fostering creativity and collaboration. Additionally, the workshop addressed techniques to boost motivation among both students and teachers, making classrooms more engaging and dynamic. Teachers had the opportunity to acquire practical ideas to implement in their own teaching practices, helping to inspire and motivate learners in today's digital age.

The outcomes of the workshop included teachers' grasping the principles of project-based learning and



ways to implement it effectively in the classroom; learning to integrate digital tools into their lessons to enhance student engagement and creativity; exploring various innovative methods that can boost motivation and improve learning outcomes for students; developing strategies to motivate both themselves and their students, creating a more dynamic and engaging learning environment; gaining skills to design project-based lessons that incorporate technology and innovative techniques.

My participation in the 23rd ELTA Serbia International Conference was a great and inspiring experience. I met many passionate educators from around the world and had the opportunity to share my ideas through the workshop *"Engaging Classrooms: Project-Based Learning and Technology for Motivating Students"*. It was also the great opportunity to learn from a wide range of innovative and practical workshops. The conference offered professional connections and stressed the importance of creativity, adaptability, and collaboration in language teaching. I return motivated, full of new ideas, and proud to have contributed to a global dialogue on improving education.

If your are looking for a conference with loads of laughter and good workshops – spend two days of learning, connecting, and growing together at the ELTAM Conference.

This May, I had the honour of taking part in the Montenegrin conference in Nikšić and enjoying plenary sessions, talks and workshops.

What is CLIL, and What Can It Offer to Both Teachers and Learners? with Phil Ball from the British Council was a huge success. It was a pleasure to be a part of an eyeopening session on Content and Language Integrated Learning (CLIL) with international education expert Phil Ball.

Language Learning in the Digital Age where we have been a part of a powerful and thought-provoking session with Catherine Jeanneau from the European Centre for Modern Languages (ECML) — and it was a deep dive into the future of language learning! Her talk, explored how language classrooms can go beyond grammar and vocabulary to shape responsible, autonomous, and digitally literate communicators. Ms. Jeanneau reminded us that language is action — and by integrating digital tools and meaningful tasks, we're not just teaching language, we're shaping future-ready citizens.

We have also followed an inspiring and thoughtprovoking session with Mr. Grant Kempton: "**PS5: Are We There Yet? Will We Ever Be There?**" With over 38 years in ELT, Mr. Grant has brought his deep experience—and a dash of humor from his teenage "trend advisors" to tackle the evolving challenges of post-pandemic education. In a world that's more digital, less human, and filled with uncertainty, he urged us to rethink how we build confidence in both teachers and students.

I also enjoyed numerous valuable workshops, among others:

Card Games for Dynamic Learning by Alenka Tratnik (IATEFL Slovenia). We are wholeheartedly thankful for laughter, learning, and lots of ideas! Teachers got handson with a variety of card-based activities—perfect for adding energy, interaction, and fun to language lessons.



Power Up Your Classroom by Matthew Gleason (ELF Kosovo) This brain-based workshop explained how memory works, offering "use on Monday" tools to boost retention, vocabulary, and grammar recall through multisensory learning. The workshop explored the fascinating intersection of learning, memory, and teaching, aiming to empower educators with practical tools, strategies, and activities to enhance student learning outcomes that result in long-term memory transference, retention, and retrieval. Participants were guided through a series of activities that explored key concepts related to memory, such as attention-sustaining activities, mnemonics for grammar practice and vocabulary building, and depth of processing techniques to facilitate multisensory learning experiences.

Engaging English: Adaptable Activities for Dynamic Classrooms by Ljiljana Šćekić (ELTA Serbia) Teachers walked away with a toolkit of adaptable, high-impact activities designed to energize learners, encourage critical thinking, and promote collaboration. This session showcased a collection of adaptable and engaging activities designed to invigorate English language lessons. The activities presented span a range of skills and can be easily modified to suit specific learning objectives and class sizes.



The Power of Intelligent Instruction by Rob Howard, IATEFL Poland, focused on how clear, thoughtful instruction design boosts student engagement and learning. Our dear speaker shared hands-on strategies for immediate classroom impact. Our participants developed effective communication skills to deliver instructions in a manner that is easily understandable by students. Furthermore, they explored various strategies, such as using visual aids, providing examples, and employing interactive methods, to facilitate effective instruction delivery. The workshop emphasized the importance of modeling and our participants learned how to craft instructions that promote critical thinking, problemsolving, and collaboration among students.

Emoji-O-Meter by Zorka Radonjić & Ivana Radulović, ELTAM. Ourbshowed how emojis—simple, relatable visuals—can energize classroom communication and help build vocabulary, grammar, and productive skills in a fun way! Emoji are definitely perfect visuals which can spice up our teaching practice and develop our students' vocabulary, grammar and therefore productive skills. Teaching things dear and known to students makes one's work easier, interesting and fun.

Let's Have Fun – Energizers, Fillers, Warm-ups! (Jelena Spasić, ELTA Serbia) We kicked things off with engaging, adaptable activities that boost motivation and language retention—because every great class starts with energy and fun! We all know that effective English language teaching goes beyond textbooks. It requires a dynamic and responsive classroom environment where students are engaged from the start and their energy levels are kept high throughout the lesson. So, how do we do that? Well, one way is to use warm-ups, fillers, and energizers. In this demo lesson, participants tried out some of the practical activities that not only enhance student motivation, build confidence and improve language retention, but also allow us to relax and have fun. The activities shown are simple and adaptable to various proficiency levels.

Writing as a Key to the Future – Peace Corps Volunteers Erika Steiger, Conrad Salisbury, and Robert Henry shared dynamic classroom experiences that develop students' creativity, critical thinking, and voice through diverse writing forms. They were kind enough to share their meaningful experiences when it came to teaching all kinds of writing to students, from academic essays to imaginative stories to poetry.

Low-Prep Vocab Revision with AI – Ekaterina Surkova spoke about how to let AI do the heavy lifting with smart, student-centered vocabulary tasks. Effective language learning relies on spaced repetition, retrieval practice, and meaningful recycling of content. In today's talk, Ms. Surkova explored how we can apply these principles to create low-prep tasks for revision and recycling of vocabulary so that a teacher can maximize learning while minimizing their workload. Our speaker showed how Al can generate customized revision activities, tailoring them to students' needs. By doing this, teachers can boost their students' engagement and ensure long-term retention of the material. This was a meaningful talk for all those teachers who would like to explore innovative ways to enhance their lessons, thus making AI their ally, not a competitor.

Iheld a workshop: **The Tie That Binds: How the Carpathia Saved the Titanic**. This multidisciplinary workshop brought history to life with authentic materials, tech tools, and creative projects—blending language learning with critical thinking and storytelling. The room was packed and the feedback lovely, we enjoyed discovering more about the project and promised to never forget the people of Carpathia.

Congratulations to ELTAM board members who organised another great conference, and especially the round table where we discussed the future of teacher training and English language teaching associations.

Every evening there were social events where participants could learn something more about Edinburgh, Scottish culture, or just relax and meet peers from all over the world.



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
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REPORT ON THE 30TH INTERNATIONAL IATEFL SLOVENIA CONFERENCE

Themed "What Keeps Us Going," this year's conference gathered educators, ELT professionals, and renowned speakers from around the world to reflect on what drives and sustains us in the ever-evolving field of language teaching.

TEACHERS' DAY-THE BRIDGE IN BRATISLAVA

Last March I attended Teachers' Day-The Bridge, a oneday conference taking place on 22nd March 2025 at the Faculty of Chemical and Food Technology STU in Bratislava.

The conference was organized by one of HUPE associates partners, The Bridge-English language centre in Bratislava. A day before the Conference, on 21st March, there was a small gathering of The Bridge associate partners where I met most of the presenters. The conference was well structured and presenters' insights, expertise and engagement truly made a good impact on the participants. There was a Plenary session and 16 workshops in the area of self-development, skills and methodology and Humanistic Language Teaching (HLT). There were four sessions of workshops in four slots followed by the discussions.

Some of the presenters were really inspiring and enriching experience for everyone involved. I will mention a few of them.



The Plenary talk by Jon Hird on Spoken Grammar, identified by grammarians as often heard in everyday conversations but not yet having become a routine in conventional ELT syllabus was really interesting. Most certainly many of our students would enjoy listening to some of the examples, as well. Mark Andrews, ever being original, had a workshop "Student=A Human Being" dealing with what is Humanistic Language Teaching. The workshop emphasized the importance of a teacher creating a positive teaching/learning atmosphere by having a more personal touch with learners in the process of learning.



A teacher sharing some private ideas and feelings with learners, being more "present" in class and with a slightly humorous touch is suggested as a part of a successful teaching.

Alan Pulverness' workshop "Walking the Talk: Putting HLT Digital into Practice" also explored the practical application of some of the principles discussed in HLT Digital to the classroom teaching.

David Fisher's beliefs that teaching is more effective if it is entertaining, introducing learners to the art of theatre, were expressed in his workshop "Emotions in the classroom".

This idea was expressed as well in my workshop "Film in class" which explained a number of reasons why film is an excellent teaching and learning tool. Different activities have shown that using film in class is motivating and enjoyable. It provides authentic and varied language, gives learners a visual context, brings variety and flexibility to the classroom helping students to develop

all four communicative skills while having fun.

And last but not the least, I would like to describe an experience of having a one-to-one coaching session with Sam Patre, which can be used with learners to help them recognize their strengths and take meaningful steps toward their goals.

Sam's coaching philosophy focuses on helping learners build confidence, improve their mindset and unlock new opportunities. This way they become able to take charge of their education.
