We also discussed some culturally specific words for which we as teachers would like to find the appropriate equivalents.

Our colleague showed us how it can be used in different ways, not only for vocabulary acquisition but also for developing all four skills, if you and your students spice it up a bit using your creativity.














SPLIT BRANCH MEETING REPORT

There were 34 teachers and I hope to see even more of us in November.



BESIG Satellite event in Croatia

This is the fifth year that the satellite event in Croatia has been organised at the University of Applied Sciences in Zaprešić. Usually the same teachers come and this year there were 9 of us. Even for those of us who work together, this is an excellent opportunity to get together, comment what we have seen, agree and disagree with speakers and other participants. The first session was by Chia Suan Chong who dealt cross-cultural communication and showed some roleplays that could help our students in international communication. She was followed by Sylvie Donna who argued that student should develop new identity when speaking English. Her claim was that an English-speaker identity may quite affect a business person's success levels



in in international communications. Then, Mike Hogan mentioned 10 steps to success with low-level business English learners offering examples from the book Business English for Beginners. The last session that we watched was also the best one and it was Evan Frendo's 'Where are we with BELF?' dealing with business English as a lingua franca. He summarised some of the recent research in that field discussing practical implications for the work of business English



teachers, trainers and writers. Although not all of the teachers who attended the event teach business English, they use this opportunity to see what is new in the field of business English which might also be applied to their teaching. The atmosphere at such an event is friendly and relaxing. We also share some of the ideas we use in teaching, discuss some problems we encounter. This year, we were also joined by a teacher from Kutina, a place about 80 km from Zagreb, motivated by the colleague who is regularly present here and who praises our organisation and the event. There are always nibbles and drinks and during the lunch break we had coffee at a nearby café. We are aware that the event could be watched at home but it would probably be

difficult to concentrate on the topics thinking about all the chores and it would be difficult to explain to your family members that you are unavailable for several hours. I am sure that we are going to continue organising such an event, as long as there are enthusiast willing to come.

INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCES

ELT Czechlist: Ideas from the Heart of Europe

The Association of Teachers of English of the Czech Republic (ATECR) is one of the partner associations of HUPE – their representatives attend our annual conference and they invite HUPE to send a representative to attend their annual conference. I was lucky to be the HUPE representative and attend their fifteenth national and the eleventh international ATECR conference in Prague, 9 - 10 September 2016.

Prague was a perfect host city for the conference and around 150 teachers from the Czech Republic and other countries enjoyed the sights, as well as very interesting talks and workshops at the conference, in the almost summer weather of the early September in Prague.

The opening ceremony was held at the Univerzita Karlova, Padegogicka fakulta, at noon on Friday, 9 September.

The biggest lecture hall was full of enthusiastic teachers welcomed by the ATECR president Libuse Kohutova, the vice president Ilona Havlickova and other representatives of the ATECR.

The first plenary was also held in the same venue – Sharka Dohnalova talked about 'Language as the tool of all the tools for including everyone in the classroom'. The plenary was very informative and it gave us all a lot of information about



the situation in the Czech Republic regarding the inclusion of SEN students, the results of her research as well as the examples of practice from Sharka's own language classroom and her work as a teacher trainer. The speaker showed us that the teachers share the same problems and the same obstacles in different countries, can improve their teaching and find new learning opportunities for their students by sharing the thoughts, ideas and the examples of good practice.

After the first plenary, the conference moved to a nearby secondary school, a huge and beautiful old building of Stredni prumyslova škola elektroechnicka, in a nearby Jecna street, also not very far from the city

centre. On Friday, workshops and talks were offered in five parallel classrooms, on a variety of topics and aimed at teachers teaching pre-school to university level. My workshop about the use of rubrics for assessment was in the first time slot and I was happy to meet teachers from the Czech Republic and their international guests and exchange ideas about rubrics. Other great topics we discussed in other workshops were the use of LMS, the element of fun in language learning and teaching, motivation, storybased CLIL for primary and many more. During the coffee break in the school cafeteria, teachers had an opportunity to get to know one another, chat, visit the exhibition with the books and other teaching materials by the Czech and international publishers and language schools. After the last workshops for the day all teachers stayed in the school cafeteria



for the buffet. The cultural programme for the evening was the performance of the Choir Orfej.



Saturday sessions began with a choice between two very good plenaries. Louel Ross Calleja's plenary was on the topic of native and non-native speakers, and Ben Dobbs talked about what learners need English for in the international communication. It was not an easy choice. I decided to listen to Louel R. Calleja and loved the lecture in which Mr Calleja spoke about co-owning English, from the perspective of a person who was born in the Philippines, educated in English and teaching internationally. He quoted Silvana Richardson and made teachers think about if native and non-native speakers are ready to share the ELT limelight, and if the inner, outer, and the expanding circles should be considered co-owners, co-stewards and co-arbiters of pedagogical norms. The speaker gave some interesting examples of accents and vocabulary from European English. The

ideas of the plenary were really some food for thought and the native and non-native teachers were happy to share their ideas in a very interesting discussion.

The concurrent sessions continued throughout the day, in six classrooms of the school in Jecna street. The Czech and international presenters gave talks and workshops until late afternoon, when the conference was closed and all teachers said goodbye to their new friends. The time came to return to my students to use the materials and include the new ideas into my lessons, to enhance my lessons and be a better teacher, feeling thankful to the colleagues from the ATECR for a very good organization of the conference, for making us all feel welcome and for a lot of great ideas I brought home from the heart of Europe.

promised, conference taken panoramic view of the current of English language teaching in Hungary and beyond. Teachers from all over the world got a chance to examine all dimensions of our diverse and changing world, and see how they affect us professionally, as well as help them to find professional directions shape their own professional pathways. Indeed, we did.

The highlight of the conference was – people, of course. It was our fellow teachers to whom I could talk to without the fear of being misunderstood, or judged in the wrong way. It was our colleagues



whom I could ask anything without being misinterpreted and looked down at. It was the people, like me, like us.

Plenary talks, as always, perfectly opened both the conference and every day. I believe the names of the speakers like Margit Szesztay, Marjolijn Verspoor, David Evans and Magdalena Kubanyiova are simply enough to mention.

The workshops, on the other hand, were diverse in the real sense of the word. There was something for everybody, from intercultural communication and multicultural challenges, English for Specific Purposes and Business English all the way to teacher education, special needs education and lifelong learning.

Here, I will write a thing or two about several that were really wonderful and that still have an enormous impact on me.

There was a great session where participants could share their views on different teaching/mentoring situations. They also had the chance to share their own stories about what kind of challenges they were facing at the moment. Here is one such story, mine. "Teaching Roma students English as a third language in primary school in Croatia was a great experience! I still do it, but not for the experience's sake but for pleasure. Why? – one would ask. Well, I like myself doing it – bringing new worlds into the classroom and then learning about theirs. Sharing with them my good days and my better days. It's difficult but it's challenging. And that's what matters!"

At this point in your career, what particular challenges are you ready to face as part of your teaching because you would like to make a difference or need to move out of your comfort zone?

This was one session that you didn't want to leave, as the presenters Uwe and Judit poured coffee and tea, gave away cookies and smiles. Such a lovely idea.

Sandra Vida talked about teaching outside the box. It was an excellent presentation which gave us an insight into organising a conference or a lesson in a similar way – starting from the expextations and the objectives you want to

achieve, not from the content itself. Whether it's your students or your colleagues, you want to impress, teach, learn from,... We usually take it for granted, but when you stop and think for a second, simple as it seems, she made us all think about it throughout the conference and later on as well.

'l ike Me: Intercultural Communicative Activities for the Classroom' was the title of Lynda Steyne's workshop. I could not even imagine what the workshop would turn into as I sat down and had to draw bread. Imagine. Bread. I'm a mother, a wife, a teacher, a woman. I should know what bread looks like, but what does it have to do with English language teaching? It took us the whole 30 minutes and more to understand it – at the very end of the session, as we compared our bread, we understood how teaching identity, nurturing student's self and moving it forward and even beyond is important. It shapes lives and it gives us the glow people often don't see in us.

Elma Velić Bešić from TETA presented interesting ways of teaching English to students with learning difficulties. The best thing was to remember that many famous people (movie stars, singers, politicians) had those difficulties during their learning process, and many still do but they always try to make the most of it. This was one session where you could sit back and enjoy seeing how well we do

such an important job. And sometimes, we need exactly that.

Finally, the organizing committee of the conference invited all the studnets majoring in English Studies from universities in Hungary and around the world to attend the first junior conference and offer a talk. At this excellent event the participants were offered talks both by experienced EFL professionals and fellow students reporting on their work, research, teaching experiences and innovative ideas. HUPE members were also invited to this event but unfortunately, we didn't have a junior representative.

All in all, I'll remember the conference for a long time!!

ELTAM Conference, Struga

From October 14th to 16th Ana Galac, Lana Duka Zupanc and me attended 9th ELTAM international teachers'conference in Struga, Macedonia, titled Re-imagining teaching, rejuvenating and transforming classroom practices. ELTAM conferences are held every two years. We flew to Skopje via Belgrade and were invited to join their Board in a mini bus travelling south to Struga (a 3hour' ride), which we happily accepted. Some international guests flew straight from London to Ohrid for 100 euros round ticket with a popular low-cost airline, which was rather convenient sinceStruga is only 17 km from Ohrid.

For us Skopje was so impressive that we did not know if we were in Las Vegas or Washington DC. The main square is a display of grandour and light, there is an enormous screen with commercials and info, newly built or redecorated white marble buildings illuminated with LED lights changing colours and a whole bunch of statues that we did not know who all the people they represented are. (Nor do the locals.) Apart from the overdose of statues, we guite liked the architecture. And the fountains! In the middle of the main square there is a statue of a warrior, on a horse, which is said to represent Alexander the Great. It dominates the square since it is taller than some of the buildings (30 meters) and from it there is water pouring on all the sides while the LED lights are changing colours from pink to lilac, purple, blue, yellow and red. Wow!







The people from ELTAM are very nice and friendly. We were in a lovely hotel overlooking Lake Ohrid and a river flowing out from it called Crni Drim, hence the name of our hotel was Crni Drim. In summer Struga is a tourist resort, but it is also a place of great diversity. Macedonians, Turks and Albanians live there and I have been told by the local teachers that all the documents that come to schools have to be written in these three languages, that is why the people are great linguists. The conference was wellprepared and ran smoothly. Both Ana and me had presentations which were well received. Since one of the topics of



the conference was networking and the future of the teachers' associations, Mark Andrews made a documentary on that, interviweing me among others. In front of everybody there Mark publicly stated that HUPE was the best in the region in terms of branches and network. He made us so proud of our Association that I immediately agreed to take part in the film, which is on YouTube and everybody is welcome to see it: just write **Build Your Teacher Association!** Marjorie Rosenberg, President of IATEFL posted a comment: 'Very

well done and really captures the essence of the bridges we build through Teacher Associations.'

We made friends and were able to taste Macedonian hospitality and their delicious food. Hope to see some of the people in Šibenik in March. Aleksandra Popovski, their President, will be coming, and we really liked what she said in her opening speech:

-When I go to a conference, I have a feeling that I belong. I go to a conference not just to travel, I can travel to different places where there are no conferences. But there I meet other teachers, people who have the same interests and passions as me. I find soul mates.'

25th INTERNATIONAL IATEFL POLAND CONFERENCE SZCZECIN

16-18 SEPTEMBER 2016

The 25th Anniversary IATEFL Poland conference was held at West Pomerian University of Technology, Szczecin. Szczecin is a lovely shipbuilding and university town situated in the north west of Poland, close to the German border and it is closer to 3 other capital cities (Berlin, Prague and Copenhagen) than its own. As a tradition, Polish conferences are held in a different town every year and only one, the 10th anniversary conference, was held in Warsaw. Approximately 1000 participants come to the conference every year.



The conference lasted 3 days and consisted of 9 plenary sessions and more than 120 workshops! I was quite amazed when I realized that there were 14 workshops going on at the same time i.e. in one time slot! It was really difficult to choose which one to attend! Beside the workshops and talks, there were also quizzes, live lessons, debates and the grand finale of a public speaking contest which I wasn't able to attend because it took place early on Friday, before my arrival.

Unfortunately, as there were 2 plenary sessions going on at the same time, it was not possible to listen to all the plenary speakers, so I will mention only some of them.

One of the plenary speakers was **Marjorie Rosenberg**, the president of IATEFL, and her topic was *Getting unstuck-stretching out of our comfort zones*. Ms Rosenberg challenged all of us to stretch out of our comfort zones, our teaching style, methods and routines we are accustomed to using. She discussed the reasons we keep doing the same routines

and suggested some ways for us to *get unstuck*.

Professor David Nunan gave the second plenary *New Ways of Teaching and Learning: A role for Technology* in which he discussed different roles technology can play in language learning and presented several instructional models in which digital learning and face-to-face instruction are blended in different ways.

I was really pleased that I have a chance to listen to **Dr Piotr Steinbrich** whom I remember







from one of the HUPE conferences. In his plenary talk, *Do we really want our students to think critically*, he discussed the place of critical thinking in the classroom and weather test-based learning gives the students a chance to start thinking critically?

I attended numerous workshops and talks but I will mention 2 of them which I enjoyed the most. **Jamie Keddie**, humorous and charming as always, talked about Online video and critical thinking. He shared with us three interactive stories which served to raise students' critical awareness of online videos as well as an opening of a communicative language classroom.

It was a real pleasure to take part in Ms **Aleksandra Zaparucka** workshop *Drama for all ages* where I learnt how to warm my vocal cords body and brain in preparation for language learning. I also experienced series of activities built around the character and designed to improve all language skills, memory and spacial thinking.

I also had a chance to deliver my workshop I like to move it. I was nervous

because it was the biggest conference I had ever attended but I am happy to say that it went very well.

The Future Classroom Lab (FCL) course "Interactive Technologies" in Brussels

The Future Classroom Lab was created by the European Schoolnet and is supported by 30 ministries of education. You can find more about FCL following this link and courses you can attend on-site or on-line following this link: http://fcl.eun.org/about

The course about interactive technologies and how to use them in teaching and learning brought together over 20 teachers. There were 4 of us from Croatia. We were all there as the winners of the national Comet award for the best eTwinning projects.



During the course we had the opportunity to try out different interactive technologies for different purposes like creating surveys, quizzes or on-line lessons.

Mentimeter is free easy-to-use software that you can use online. It is an interaction tool that enables your students to actively participate in your lessons. Students can give their opinions or give answers anonymously to questions that you can prepare in advance. It can also be used to check if students have understood your explanation. You can choose among different types of questions. The options we tried out during the course are "multiple choice", "scales", "open ended", "100 points" and "who will win" questions. Each type of question is meant to be used for different purposes. For example you should use "multiple choice" when you want to give more alternatives to be voted on and you can also allow your students to give more than one vote. "Scales" are used to rate statements on a scale from 0 to 5. "Open ended" questions allow your students to give their own answers or share their opinions. "100 points" give your students the option to distribute 100 points among the alternatives you added. "Who will win?" gives each studenst one vote to cast on one of the options you give them and you can decide when you want to reveal the winner which makes the whole process of voting more exciting.

Another interactive tool we learned about is *Nearpod*. It is a user-friendly ed-tech platform that gives teachers the possibility to create interactive lessons which they can use either in real time or for a student-paced lesson – flipped classroom. You can add your pdf documents, presentations or start creating a new presentation and add interactive features this tool offers. It is as easy as creating power point presentation slides to which you can add quizzes, polls, surveys or even ask your students to draw something. If you decide to use this app in your lesson, there is another great feature that this app has. It is a little red light that comes up if your student is inactive or not in the app.

This course inspired me and gave me some new insights of the meaningful use of interactive technologies both in lessons and in eTwinning projects. There are so many tools out there and the courses like this one help teachers to learn efficiently how to use them both for teaching and learning.


