The Rijeka members got a chance to hear about two great projects carried out in our city. The first project was done in one of Rijeka's private kindergartens and it showed us how children see famous artworks. Since children of that age can express themselves best through drawings and paintings, their 'teachers' introduced them artists such as Dali, Picasso, Kahlo and many more. They even created their own book of art containing their own artworks based on famous paintings. They use as many resources as they can find. Some of the things they use in their classes they make by themselves. But the point is children love it! This summer they held a science camp in Klana where children learnt Maths and English but in the most creative way; so they made their own solar cooker and they fried eggs. They wrote their own anthem which I hope Anja and Jelena will teach us some other time.

Still under the impression of today's branch meeting which was also the last one in my presidential term and sort of my 'Goodbye', I want to thank all the Rijeka members for coming to our branch meetings and accepting my way of governing the branch which basically meant a lot of meetings, many interesting presentations and workshops and meeting many great people. 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Hupe – Karlovac branch has been active since the very beginnings of HUPE. Today there are 18 HUPE members who participate in HUPE – Karlovac activities.

We organize four meetings in a school year at Industry and Trade Vocational School, Domobranska 2, Karlovac. The current Branch president is Dubravka Lapcic from Industry and Trade Vocational School.

There were four meetings held last school year, in January, March, April and June.

The following presenters held presentations or workshops:

1.Gregor Pirš, ELT and special needs educator from Slovenia, CAR Uk didaktično svetovanje, Trebež: **Multisensory teaching with cuisenary rods** (90 min WS) and **Brainacs** (80 min WS). The first workshop offered many types of activities useful for all ages, which can have a positive impact on students' self-esteem as well as being creative and engaging way of teaching in the class. It also proved to be a very proactive approach in teaching students with special needs. The second workshop, The Brainacs, presented how neurons function in a human brain and what does multitasking actually do to a brain.

2.Anita Jokić, Prva riječka hrvatska gimnazija: Creative Methodology (60 min WS) and **Grammar in Music** (45 min WS). These interesting workshops, aimed both for elementary and secondary school teachers, showed how teachers can raise the interest of students in the process of learning a foreign language as well as engage them in different tasks to be more successful in acquering one.

Among twenty interesting activities which most certainly bring fun to class, teachers took interest most and enjoyed tremendously KAHOOT IT quiz using smartphones, and Dvolver moviemaker, a webpage to produce a DVD.

3.Lidija Štefić, Stomatološki fakultet and Nadja Dešpalj, colleagues from Zagreb, ran a 45 min workshop **An E-portfolio as a Learning Tool.** This workshop showed how to prepare students for EU mobility scheme and write successfully a Europass CV in an anti-chronological order.

The presenters also discussed the benefits of using e-portfolios such as personalizing the learning experience and drawing connections between various ones, developing multimedia skills, seeing progress over time, enhancing critical thinking, assessing course learning outcomes and the possibility of tutoring each student individually.

Eric Williams, a political advisor at the political-economical section at the U.S. Embassy in Zagreb had a talk on U.S. Elections, which gave us a better insight into all the activities taken by candidates and their parties before the Election Eve. This talk was followed by many questions about the process of electing and supporting candidates, about the Primary Elections in each state to elect the members to Electoral College and the General Elections to elect the President and Vice-President of the U.S.

Fourteen HUPE – Karlovac members also attended HUPE Conference this year.

Four meetings will be held in the new school year 2016/2017.

The first meeting will be held in October. Vesa Tonder, an education specialist from Finland will give a presentation on positive effects of the latest reforme in Finish education system.

KARLOVAC BRANCH MEETING

HUPE - Karlovac organized its fourth meeting in the school year 2015/2016 in collaboration with the U.S. Embassy in Zagreb and Karlovac Town Library.

The meeting was held on 28th June 2016 at 11 00 a.m. at Knjižnica za mlade, Banjavčićeva 8, Karlovac.

Mr. Eric Williams, political advisor at the political – economical section at the U.S. Embassy in Zagreb delivered a very interesting 60 min. talk "U.S. Elections".

The presidential elections in U.S. are held every four years in November.

It was very insightful to learn about the electoral system, about Primary Elections in each state to elect the members to Electoral College who will later vote to elect the President and the Vice President of the U.S. at the General Elections.

The meeting was attended by 20 teachers and two representatives of the County of Karlovac who made many questions for Mr. Williams.

At the end of the meeting, Mr. Williams gave a statement for the local television.

INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCES

14th ELTA Serbia Conference 20 – 21 May 2016 Singidunum University, Belgrade

Inspired by Malala Yousafzai's words 'One child, one teacher, one book & one pen can change the world' the 14th ELTA conference was held on 20th and 21st May at Singidunum university in Belgrade, Republic of Serbia.

It consisted of 6 plenary sessions and more than 50 workshops, presentations and talks. The opening plenary was held by **Helena Curtain**, **Ph.D** and the topic was 'Head, Heart, and Hands: The Important Mission of English Teachers' in which she talked about the important mission of the English teachers as they work to provide learning experiences that encompass 'head', 'heart' and 'hands'. The main idea of her presentation was that 'The best teachers teach from the heart and not from the book'.

The second plenary was about 'The brain: a magnificient learning machine' in which **Anna Kolbuszewska** talked about how the recent brain research helps us understand better how memory works and what makes learning more effective.

Dr Katarina Rasulić from the University of Belgrade gave a third plenary 'On the meaning of teaching' in which she addressed the issue of what the English language itself reveals about the meaning of terms from the

semantic field of teaching taking into account different pertinent models of semantic analysis.

Jon Hird gave an excellent insight into what dyslexia really is and how it can affect the learner as well as what we as teachers can do to help in the forth plenary titled 'Reaching Every Student in the Classroom: Dyslexia and Learning English'.

The fifth plenary 'Absolutely flabbergasted! Some aspects of teaching and learning English vocabulary' was the one by **Tim Bowen** in which he focused on what can help to make words memorable.





The honour to close the 14th ELTA conference belonged to **Mark Andrews** who talked about 'English teachers as Educators: The Broader Context of our Work' in which he said that teaching English is much more than just teaching a foreign language and he mentioned some approaches and activities which develop students' intercultural as well cultural skills and sharpen their language.

Among more than 50 workshops, presentations and talks I have to mention two. Why were they so special? Well, both were held by two HUPE representatives. **Branka Šegvić** from Split talked about 'Gender and learning style preferences' in which she presented her reasearch about whether there is any connection between a person's gender and learning style in the context of an ELT classroom.

The second presentation I mentioned was mine. It was a great privilege to represent HUPE and I did my best. I hope those who attended my presentation think the same. The title of my presentation was 'Dream big! Small village pupils become citizens of the world' within which I talked about 'United in diversity', a big cultural project which my four pupils and I carried out in a small village in Gorski kotar. What made that project so special was the fact that its lenght and everything it incorporated made it one of the biggest projects in English carried out in our homeland. And once again I want to express my thanks to my four divas – Valentina Alinčić, Mirjam Golik, Roberta Vučinić and Vanja Vučinić.

The 14th ELTA conference was my first one – not only the first foreign cnference I attended but also the one where I gave my very first presentation. The first presentation in my life and it took place in beautiful Belgrade. Definitely the memory I'll cherish for life.

A SNEAK PEEK INTO OUR CLASSROOMS

SOME LEARNING STRATEGIES IN TEACHING CLOTHES

As a teacher of English as a foreign language I would like to show some possible activities which can help in learning new expressions. I've been working with young learners from the age of 9 to 15 for many years and I have found some activities very useful. They make the lessons pupil-centred and at the same time the organisation of work forces pupils to be responsible for what they are expected to do, to co-operate, organize themselves and develop new ideas in individual, pair or group work.

In my lesson plan I have tried to point out different learning strategies in teaching clothes, according to different types of pupils that I teach. I suggest some pleasant ways of learning clothes:

- -using pictures for visual learners,
- -role-playing, miming and moving a lot for kinaesthetic learners and
- -working with text/words for aural learners.

LESSON PLAN:

- 1) Goals:
- -pupils learn expressions for different types of clothes
- -they learn phrases, used when buying clothes
- -they can describe clothes, using some already known words and structures (colours, size, Present Continuous Tense, singular- plural)
- 2) The organisation of work:
- -group work with some inter-dependent tasks
- -individual work
- -pair work

We make three groups, according to types of pupils at the beginning of the lesson. Each group chooses its leader, who is »responsible« for their work. Each group gets a list of things that pupils have to do during the lesson with the instructions and time available for doing each step.

Each task is marked as individual, pair or group work, so that pupils can organise the work inside the group very quickly and the leader can follow the work to reach the aims of learning.

Before starting with the group work, some extra help is given to each group:

Group 1: magazines, pictures + descriptions

Group 2: key words

Group 3: instructions for dressing for different occasions

3) Pupils' tasks:

Group 1- visual learners:

• Pupils collect some pictures of clothes, taken from magazines, and group them into summer/ winter clothes, boys'/girls' clothes, modern/old-fashioned clothes (this task is done in pairs).

- They label the clothes (individual work).
- They make some combinations -What goes together and why? (Example: sandals and shorts, because we wear them in summer.). Each member of a group makes his own combination and presents it to the others, adding the explanation.
- They match the descriptions of the clothes to the pictures (Example: You put it round your neck.- It's a scarf.) (Pair work).

Group2- aural learners:

- -Pupils perform a dialogue in the clothes shop, using key words (Group work).
- -They take roles of talking clothes they pretend to be a pair of shoes, a T-shirt, a skirt..., and tell the others their own stories (individual or pair work).

Group3 - kinaesthetic learners:

- -Pupils take roles of models and reporters and present a fashions show (pair work).
- -Some pupils are dressed for special occasions. The others try to guess where they are going (to a football match, a wedding, a party, a disco,...).
- -Some pupils use the mime game-guess what I am putting on.

At the end of the lesson all three groups present their tasks to other pupils.

If time permits, we listen to the song What are you wearing that can be found on the internet page and sung in different versions.

SOuL camp Serbia: Rivers, Ripples and Reflections

This unique, mindful, holistic, life-changing (as the participants described it) teachers` development camp was held in Sremski Karlovci, third time in a row, organised by SOL and gathering teachers from Russia, Ukraine, Slovakia, Poland, Croatia, Kosovo and Serbia.


The aim of the course was to explore the local environment and to begin to understand the values, attitudes and beliefs of people in Sremski Karlovci, as a way of experiencing team work where students explore their own local area to deepen their knowledge and understanding of their own culture and their skills in English.

The fieldwork and the activities on the camp were examples of:

Revisiting how we take students out of the classroom and structure experiences which involve them, help them to reflect and understand without sitting behind desks and absorbing information.

Finding what connects us as seeing the river as a symbol of that and also as a resource that we need to nurture and cherish.

Experiencing both local and international









Mark Andrews, the tutor, said: The river Danube has been the main artery of our camp. We drank wine on the Danube on the first night, ate fish soup, threw pebbles into the Danube and told stories on the penultimate night, took boats on the Danube on two days of the camp, swam in the Danube and explored the Danube wetlands with a local expert on flora and fauna in the area. The ripples from it have been the ripples that we, as teachers, have made and will make on our ELT practice and the reflections are what we have made on our teaching practice and what we have seen when we have held up a mirror to our own teaching and to ourselves

We would like to share some of the participants' impressions:

First you feel like a wooden door and hardly manage to force your limbs into a few individual positions feeling happy you haven't fallen down... Gradually with a bit of practising, your arms, legs and back suddenly meet each other halfway, rythms synchronise, and your whole body starts working in unison with your mind... Yesterday, when we were disturbing smooth waters of the Danube with our









well-travelled pebbles, I felt the same. Waves and ripples immediately reshape a huge powerful river mixing layers of water and revealing what's hidden on the bottom. It came to my mind that as teachers we should cause those individual ripples disturbing the solid and seemingly immovable educational system. If more and more ripples appear, they won't remain unseen.

My participation in the SO(u)L Camp in Sremski Karlovci was an important stepping stone in my growth as a global educator; an experience which convinced that together united, we can make a difference. After receiving the first emails from the organizers, I realized that it was not going to be a conventional teacher training experience. What can you expect if you are asked to bring: a book in English that you would be prepared to give away, a small object that somehow represents your country/culture that you would be prepared to give away, a sample of national food to share at the international dinner, something connected to a river in your country, a small box of matches, and... a pebble?

The exchange of foods and drinks from each person's country and singing songs from each others' countries were among the most memorable nights of the camp. We tried different kinds of wine, sweets and snacks, which very often served as a springboard for discussions about our cultural differences and... similarities.

MY CELTA ADVENTURE

Travelling and teaching! That has always been my dream. How would it be to teach English to somebody who doesn't speak your language or any language you understand at all? To me it sounded like a chellange. Why not I thought, grabbed my computer and started searching for a place in Europe where I can spend a summer teaching English.

To my surprise there were plenty of vacancies but in every single one they were looking for a native or non-native teacher with CELTA. What is CELTA I wondered? And again, thanks to my very good friend Mr Google I soon discovered that CELTA stands for Certificate in Teaching English to Adults

As the official Cambridge English site says: "The essential TEFL qualification that's trusted by employers,



OK, essential knowledge. I have plenty of knowledge and experience and a faculty degree. Why would I need that. Well to get a teaching job abroad everything I have is just the equivalent to almost nothing. If you don't have CELTA or in some parts of the world TEFL certificate, there is no way you can get a job. In most language schools in Europe TEFL, being a certificate which is much easier to get is not accepted.

So I decided to take this course. How difficult can it be? It's essential and I've been teaching for 20 years. This will be as easy as a,b,c.

Oh how wrong I was.

I started searching for the best place to do it. It turned out the closest to Croatia is the one held in IH Mint in Ljubljana. But they only had one date which didn't suit me. The next closest was the one in IH Syllabus in Belgrade and they had the perfect date for me. Not to mention that it was cheaper. Because this course **is not** cheap. It's an intensive one month course, so apart from the course costs you have to find accomodation and move and live in Belgrade for a month.

I applied for that one. But you don't get accepted only because you apply. The procedure took a few months. You have to do LAT- language analysis test, than two essays, language test and if you pass all these tests you are invited to a skype interview which lasts an hour and you have another oral exam to prove you have the right "way of thinking" and you are presented with very strict rules of the course.



After three months of testing I was accepted. By then I realized this was everything but an easy course. But I really wanted it.

So I moved to Belgrade at the end of June. And that was the most amazing experience, I've had recently. I met 11 other colleagues, most of whom were from Belgrade. Only me and Kristina, the girl from Trebinje were not. I found out that

many teachers from Serbia work abroad and many of them invest a lot of time and money in teacher development after the studies. To my disappointment I found out that only maybe one Croatian teacher a year comes to CELTA course and to be honest many of my colleagues were puzzled with my decision to take it and thought it was a waste of time and money, because it's essential and it's something we do at the faculty.

Well how wrong. This course is everything but that. Very intensive, daunting and demanding. But worth doing and apart from providing you with a certificate which allows you to work literally wherever you want in the world gives you a totally new perspective and view to teaching.

The 12 of us were divided in two groups and each group got their tutor. The course consists of input sessions, TP-teaching practice, feedback sessions and 4 assignments. You have to do 6 TP's of 40 minutes and 2 TP's of 60 minutes on two different levels and with two different tutors. You get graded for every TP as well as for your effort, participation in feedback sessions, team work, just about everything. You are closely monitored all the time and everything is noted in your Celta 5 blue book. That's your portfolio which is assessed by an external auditor and after the course sent to Cambridge to be checked and assessed once again.

So for the first two weeks my group was teaching elementary level, and the other two weeks we were teaching intermediate level. Lessons are closely monitored by the tutor and your colleagues and after the lesson there is a feedback session in which everybody has to participate actively because it affects your grade. Every week different areas of teaching are in focus and graded. Some of them are classroom management, language analysis, rappor with students, lesson planning, all in all there are more than 80 areas to cover in four weeks. You get grades for your lessons, and everything has to be planned and performed according to Cambridge method. You have to show improvement with every TP and you have to prove that you are learning and growing as a teacher.

After lunch there are input sessions. We were taught how to plan a skills lesson, or a language lesson. How to present vocabulary or grammar in a student centered way. And many other things. Everything about this method is about student centeredness. At the beginning I didn't understand but in the end I learnt a revealing method for me. It makes student do all the job and the teacher is there just to plan, organize and monitor. It's a fantastic method that gives results very quickly.

Apart from that you have to write 4 assignments and by the end of every week hand in one. The assignments are Focus on the learner, Language analysis task, Creating authentic materials and Lessons from the classroom.

I slept 5 hours a night the most in this month but I don't regret it. What I experienced and learnt on this course can not be compered to any course I took before. Input heavy, very intensive, new ideas and methods loaded, condensed and the most fantastic methodology course I have ever taken.

I would recommend it to every teacher no matter how much experience you have. In fact the more experience you have the harder it can be to you. You have to be open minded and ready to change and learn something new. It's far from essential, although if you have experience it might be easier for you to stand in front of the class and teach.



Anyway I would wholeheartedly recommend it. It isn't cheap, it's daunting, it's exhausting but it's great. Not to mention wonderful 11 colleagues I met there, new connections and new opportunities.

Go for it!

My next step is DELTA, a diploma, a higher even more demanding course which lasts longer, takes longer to do it but gives you even more opportunities to grow and develop as a teacher.
